Week Ope What if it's True THAT GOD KEEPS HIS PROMISES?



Today, we'll be learning about prophecies from the Old Testament and where they are fulfilled in the New Testament. Prophecy in the Bible is when God gives a special message to a person (called a prophet) to share with others. Sometimes the message was about what was happening right then, and sometimes it happened in the future.

You'll find references when the verse is mentioned, along with where it is fulfilled. Please take the time to read the reference aloud so that your child has a sense of where the prophecies are located in the Bible. If you would like a complete list of the references, you'll find it at the bottom of this page.

Have you ever made a promise to a friend, like promising to share your snack or play with them at recess? Did you keep your promise? Sometimes we forget or can't keep our promises, but God never forgets.

What if God keeps His promises? Every Sunday in NMC Kids, we say, "We help people find and follow Jesus. The good news about Jesus comes from a special book called the Bible. Every promise in the Bible is true, and it happened in this world!" If God really kept all His promises, what would that look like? The good news is that He does! God is faithful and always keeps His promises.


From the very beginning, God promised Abraham that the whole world would be blessed through his family (Genesis 12:3). God kept that promise through Abraham's family: Isaac, Jacob, Judah, and eventually David. God promised David that He would establish a kingdom that would last forever through his descendant. God kept those promises through Jesus - He came from their family line (Luke 3:34)!

God also made promises about Jesus' birth in the Old Testament. The prophet Isaiah said the Savior would be born of a virgin, which He is (Isaiah 7:14; Luke 1:35). Micah said He would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2; Matthew 2:4-6). Hosea said God would call His Son out of Egypt (Hosea 11:1) which He did when Jesus was a little boy (Matthew 2:14–15). The writer of the Psalms even told us that He would be a man on this earth (Psalm 8:5-6). Guess what? Every single one of those promises came true in Jesus! God is a faithful promise keeper. We can trust Him with our lives—because if He kept all those promises before, He will keep His promises to us too!

Hint: All of the genealogy promises are on the top half, and the prophecies about Jesus' birth are on the bottom half.



Luke 2:8-20

Read together about the shepherds who were the first to hear the good news of Jesus' birth.



What's the most surprising or exciting news you've ever gotten? Maybe a trip, a present, or a fun surprise? (Allow everyone to share) On the very first Christmas night, the shepherds got the most surprising and exciting news ever. Jesus had been born! That news reminds us that God is easy to talk to. He came close to us in Jesus. Christmas is the story of God coming close to us.

Think about the shepherds in the fields. They were ordinary people, living simple lives, often overlooked by others. Yet the angels came to them first with the news of Jesus' birth. God didn't send the message only to kings or rich people. He came to ordinary people like you and me.

That shows us something important: **God came for everyone**. He came for the shepherds in the fields, for Zacchaeus up in a tree, and for the children who wanted to sit on Jesus' lap.

There's no "junior" Holy Spirit. Kids don't get a smaller or weaker version of God. He listens to your prayers just as much as He listens to an adult's prayers. God is easy to talk to, no matter who you are or where you come from. He just wants to have a relationship with you and for you to communicate with Him.

Let's think about Zacchaeus, a man who had made some bad choices and wasn't liked by the people around him. He climbed a tree just to see Jesus, and Jesus noticed him. Jesus called him down and went to his house. That simple act of love and attention completely changed Zacchaeus' heart. He promised to do the right thing, give back what he had taken, and follow Jesus.

The same is true for us. God comes to us with love, ready to meet us where we are. It doesn't matter where your story began. God can write a new page every day. That's the heart of Christmas: Jesus was born to come close to us, to love us, and to change our hearts, just like He changed Zacchaeus' heart.



Heart-Changing Acts (see the activity guide)

- 1. Each family member will receive a heart-shaped card on cardstock provided for them.
 - 2. On the heart, write one thing you want Jesus to help change in your heart or help you do better, like being kinder, more patient, or more forgiving.
 - 3. Find a central place in your home (like a wall or Christmas tree) and hang the hearts there. This will be your **Christmas Tree of New Hearts**.
- 4. Pray together: ask Jesus to help change each heart and thank Him for being easy to talk to and loving.
 - 5. Each week, pick one heart and talk about how you saw Jesus helping you grow in that area.

Optional: Do a small act of kindness that week that matches the heart change you wrote down, like helping a sibling, sharing a toy, or writing a thank-you note—just like Zacchaeus chose to show Jesus' love in action.





Matthew 1:18-23

Read together about the angel telling Joseph that Mary would have a son named Jesus, "God with us."



Have you ever been afraid of the dark, a thunderstorm, or maybe trying something new? (Let everyone share.)

When the angel appeared to Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds, the very first words were: "Do not be afraid." Why? Because God was with them. Christmas is all about the birth of Emmanuel, which means "God with us." Jesus came to Earth so we would never be alone, but it's even more than that. When we follow Jesus, His Spirit actually lives inside of us. God is not just near us; He's with us wherever we go.

Let's think about the shepherds out in the fields. They were ordinary people doing their jobs at night when suddenly the sky filled with angels. They were terrified! But the angel told them: "Do not be afraid...a Savior has been born." The presence of Jesus took away their fear. Did you know there are others in the Bible who were also reminded of the truth that God is with us? God told Moses, "I will be with you" in Exodus 3:11-12. When Joshua had to lead the Israelites into Jericho, God said, "Do not be afraid... for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." Just like God's presence helped to remove their fear, relying on Jesus can help us overcome our fear, too. We don't have to fear the dark, new situations, being left out, or even the future, because Emmanuel means God is with us. He is with us at school, at home, at bedtime, at the store, in the car, everywhere!

Christmas is the celebration that this promise came true. Jesus is our Emmanuel. When we trust in Him, His Spirit makes our hearts His home. We're never, ever alone. This week, every time you feel afraid, whisper to yourself: "Emmanuel, God is with me."

And every time you feel lonely, remind yourself: "Emmanuel, God is with me."



Emmanuel Footprints (see the activity guide)

1. Cut out the provided paper footprints.

- $2. \ On \ the \ top \ of \ each \ one, \ write \ a \ place \ you \ go \ of ten \ (school, home, church, sports, store).$
 - 3. On the bottom half of each footprint, write: "God is with me."
 - 4. Tape them in a path on the floor.
- 5. Take turns following the path. As you walk over them, say together: "God is with me everywhere I go."










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WEEK 1 ACTIVITY
